- Neighborhood Watch: Proactive patrols of neighborhood watch locations when able. Spoken with both active and non-active NW groups. Follow up with recent contacts regarding the formation/implementation of new groups throughout city, specifically Pleasant Street area as residents are complaining of loitering and possible drug use.
- Researching and relaying crime and neighborhood statistics for prospective homebuyers within the community.

FLEET ISSUES:

- Performing and/or coordinating and transporting and/or facilitating all repairs to vehicles in police fleet needing emergency lighting-siren/ aftermarket vehicle equipment/ ICOP units/and mobile data terminal repair. Replaced Charge guard 261 DA, Repaired

overhead lights, control switch, rear deck lights, center console, PA holder and ICOP in several different vehicles

- Working with IT, attempting to resolve several minor issues with in car computer systems in many of the new patrol vehicles as well as minor issues with existing fleet, particularly 12 DA and 222 DA.
- Coordinating and transportation of vehicle equipment and supplies to and from Fleet Auto Service (West Haven, CT) for current upfitting process.
- ICOP – Performing all physical maintenance and repairs to DVR units and additional components as capabilities allow. Remedying issues with defective components with Safety Vision as well follow up on all recent purchase orders and writing new purchase orders for additional equipment that is necessary to keep the system functioning. Routine contact with sales, customer service and tech support for warranty and repair/replacement of equipment. Repaired ICOP units as well as replaced batteries from individual officers' portable wireless microphones.
- Coordinating repairs with Fleet Auto supply for warranty repairs as well as repairs beyond internal capabilities.
- Vehicle maintenance/repair requests being coordinated on a daily basis by way of fax and email contact with PW.
- Fleet registration renewals (DMV)
- Fleet emissions compliance testing (transporting to and from testing facility for individual testing).
- ELSAG License Plate Readers- Addressing issues that are arising from the addition of two units to our fleet, meeting with reps in attempts to get system in full operation.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT SEPTEMBER 2012

PAL just completed the busiest summer season on record with two programs running concurrently and an annual event added to the activities.

First, our fourth annual summer camp began at the end of the school year and continued on for the next seven weeks, into the second week of August. Even though this is a tight economy, we were able to provide services to an average of 30-35 children each week for the entire term.

Along with the summer camp, we also had the SYRP going for six weeks, and that involved 20 students in two separate work places for the term. One site was Abbot Tech for woodworking and several other sites for landscaping. These two programs kept PAL busy with scheduling, site procurement, staffing and finally payroll.

With the two programs listed above keeping us busy, we also put on our annual "Bob Dinardo" Memorial Golf Tournament at Richter Park on August 1st. This was the third year we held the tournament but the first time we were at Richter Park and it was our most successful with over 90 golfers participating. It was a beautiful day and everyone commented what a fun tournament it was. We hope to hold it at Richter Park for many years to come. Also, we are dedicating some of the proceeds in the form of college scholarships for two senior students next year.

Finally, on the first weekend of September, we held a "Kids Closet" tag sale at PAL, the first of three this year, and on the first day there wasn't a parking place to be had.

Next month, PAL takes of with basketball, special events like The SNYRA, and we start to get busy with fall programming.

Subject: **Police Explorer Monthly Activity Report – August 2012**

This month started on a fun, yet solemn note, with a contingent of our Explorers and Advisors attending the Annual Connecticut Law Enforcement Memorial Day at Lake Compounce Amusement Park in Bristol, on Tuesday, August 7th. The cost was \$60 per person, but the Post was able to subsidize a portion of the cost for attendees through recent fundraising efforts, so it only cost \$30 per Explorer. The Post had to rent a school bus to get the group to Lake Compounce. Advisor Sgt. Tragni and Civilian Associate Advisors Cohn and Rountos were the adults in charge. The whole contingent attended the candlelight vigil and memorial service for Connecticut's Fallen Officers. This is the fifth time that we have attended this event in the past five years.

On Tuesday, August 14th, took a small select team of Explorers took turns, as did the Advisors, of securing the open grave site of Albert Afraid of Hawk in Wooster Cemetery. This was at the request of Mayor Boughton to assist with this news making event. Approximately 10 -12 Explorers and at least two Advisors arrived at 1800 and we secured the perimeter of Wooster Cemetery and the immediate area of the gravesite. Throughout the night there were Explorers switching out due to work and other commitments. At midnight there was a complete Advisor staff change. Explorers and advisors took turns on post, with giving each other breaks, with periods of sleep for those on break, in our vans. Extreme weather, in the form of thunderstorms, did strike in the early morning hours of 8/15, but the explorers remained on post and the weather passed over quickly.

Although we see our Explorers often in the education/training mode or in the community service work mode, once in a while we take time out for a social event to keep the morale high among the members. On Friday evening, August 24th, our post set up another night of GLOW bowling at the Lore's Lanes bowling alley in New Milford. As well as being a "social outing" it also was a fundraiser for the Post. Explorers, with many bringing guests, came out for the evening which lasted for two hours of reduced cost bowling. A good time was had by all and a small amount of money was raised while doing so.

Saturday, August 25th, saw a small contingent of Explorers, along with Advisor P.O. Cameron, assist the Holy Trinity Church with its annual 5k run in the Aunt Hack/Joe's Hill Road area. This run is conducted annually to help raise money for food for the homeless and those in need.

As you can see, we ended the month with 69 Explorers registered. This is a decrease of 5 since last month's report. These represent Explorers who were leaving for college, moved away, or "aged out" of the program. With the start of a new school year upon us, we will most likely have more youth apply to be in the Post.
